



Butterflies AND THEIR Caterpillars



For a butterfly-friendly garden:

Checklist

- Young silver or black wattle
- Nectar plants for adults
- Host plants for eggs and caterpillars
- Brightly coloured open flowers (yellow, purple, orange and red)
- Range of plants that will flower throughout spring, summer and autumn
- Flat rocks for butterflies to sun themselves and court each other
- Shallow dish of water amongst plants or create depressions in the soil for mud-puddling
- No insecticides

Whilst we can all enjoy the visual beauty of a butterfly in a garden, butterflies and their caterpillars are an important part of the food web as food for other native animals such as birds, frogs and lizards. Native butterflies are fantastic pollinators in your garden. They are a valuable part of our urban ecosystem.

Creek banks and eucalypt forests

Wingspan: 5 cm



Swallowtail caterpillars are often found nibbling on fresh citrus leaves.

They will eat the leaves until some stems are bare. Usually the citrus will not be disturbed by the amount of leaves that these caterpillars eat. Please keep them there and soon they will form a cocoon on the stem.
