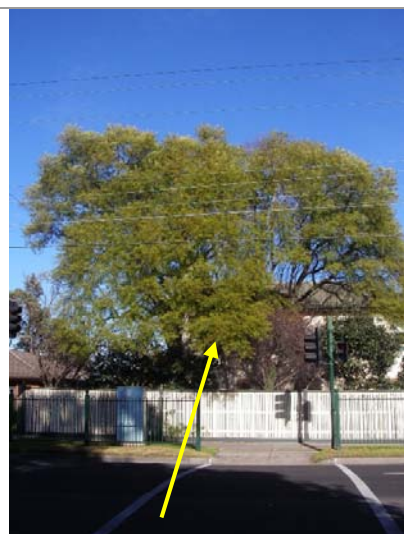
Statement of Significance:

Statement of Significance:

These three trees are the largest trees on the property. Tree #1 has a very large stem diameter and dominates the streetscape. Tree #2 is of good health and structure. It has been slightly suppressed by tree #1. Tree #3 is also of good health and structure. It is at the rear of the property and is one of the tallest trees in the immediate area. Trees #1-3 all contribute to the wider landscape and have a good life expectancy and are worthy of inclusion within the Register.

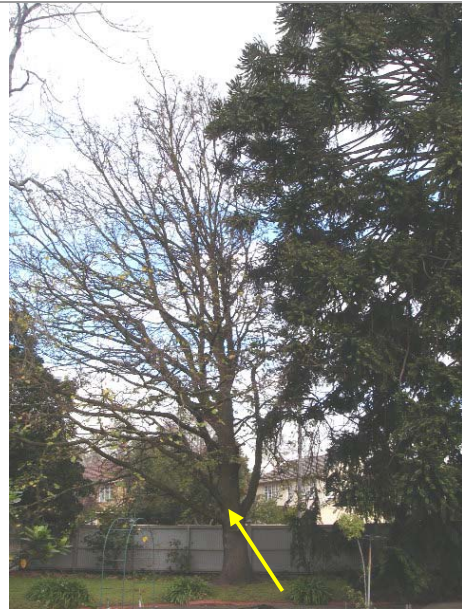

Limb drop does occur in this type of tree but is manageable through pruning. Both trees are suitable for inclusion on the Significant Tree Register.

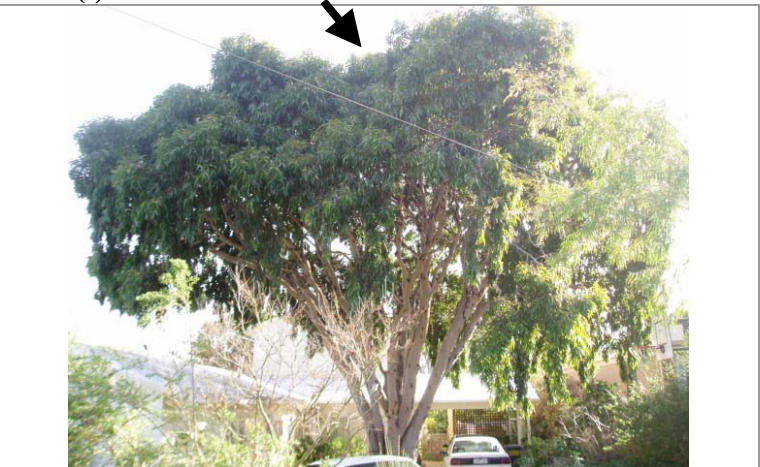
Statement of Significance:
