



Festivals Grant Fact Sheet

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Funding amount

Up to \$10,000

What is this grant for?

This grant provides support for local community events and festivals that deliver positive outcomes at a large scale across the Whitehorse community. This includes festivals that celebrate culture, bring people together, activate places and strengthen community identity.

Who can apply?

- Not-for-profit and incorporated organisations, clubs and community groups who are actively engaged in the Whitehorse community.
- Organisations that are auspiced by an appropriate not-for-profit incorporated organisation.

Who should not apply?

- Applicants seeking funding for smaller, one-off purchases (see Micro Funds).

Festivals may be less suitable if they:

- Primarily promote a commercial business or product
- Are private events with limited public access
- Lack community participation or benefit
- Focus mainly on fundraising for an organisation

Important things to note

- The Festivals Grant is the only grant category whereby applicants can apply for the same grant year on year
- This grant is **very competitive**. Applicants will need to clearly outline the impact the festival will have for the local community, with scaled events taking preference.
- You will be required to submit extensive proof that funding has been allocated in line with the funding agreement, including all receipts for purchases and photographs of the event.

Conditions of funding

- Provide written acknowledgement of Whitehorse City Council's funding support in promotional material, publications and annual reports for the duration of the grant
- Agree to take part in occasional checks by Council to make sure the funding is being used as approved
- Meet any additional conditions outlined in your funding agreement
- Meet additional key requirements outlined in your application, including your commitment to Whitehorse City Council's environmental sustainability goals and the Victorian Charter of Human Rights.

Application demonstrates a clear community need for the proposed project/ initiative and is supported by relevant data, case studies and/or, local knowledge. Application demonstrates that the success of the project/ initiative will not rely on ongoing funding from Council.	Application demonstrates that the organisation has genuine capacity to deliver the project/ initiative and clearly shows how funding from Council will be used.

What assessors look for

Strong applications usually show:

- ✓ Broad community participation
- ✓ Cultural, social or creative value
- ✓ Accessible and inclusive event planning
- ✓ Partnerships with local organisations
- ✓ Safe event management planning

How funding levels are determined

Each application receives a weighted score based on the assessment criteria. This score helps determine how much funding may be offered, subject to available funds.

How well you score will directly impact how much funding you receive based on the below thresholds:

More than 85% — 100% of the requested funding

Over 75% to 85% — 85% of the requested funding

Over 65% to 75% — 75% of the requested funding

Less than 65% — funding may be considered subject to available funds

Meeting the assessment criteria does not guarantee funding. Final funding decisions are subject to Council approval and available budget.
