



Statement of Significance:

This tree is located in the rear yard of the property. It is a remnant, indigenous tree. It is very tall and visible from surrounding areas. This tree dominates the area. It is of good health but has three main stems. The union between two of these is fairly open and is reasonably sound. The union between the other two main stems is tight, with some included bark present. The remainder of the form of this tree is good. The weak union at the base could be managed and supported through a steel cable system in the canopy and weight reduction pruning. This type of work is justifiable for this tree due to its size, health and remnant significance. This tree would be suitable for inclusion within the Register if it is properly managed.


